 positions, to include core papers in statutory planning and urban design (SURV130, 205, 455,
 303 and 453 in our curriculum) and allied areas in which the candidates have expertise and
 interest
- As a Lecturer or Senior Lecturer, growing an active research programme that inspires students, attracts competitive funding, and aligns with the aspirations of Māori communities. Publishing in high-quality peer-reviewed journals and partnerships that lead to outputs of value to Māori are both important in this role.
- As a Professional Practice Fellow, maintaining an active and forward-looking professional
 profile, and growing meaningful, productive partnerships in areas of mutual interest for
 community benefit. Applicants interested in completing a postgraduate degree alongside the
 PPF appointment are encouraged to note this in their covering letter.
- Contributing to the effective and efficient running of the School to meet its responsibilities within the University and wider community.
- Contributing to support of the University's Māori, Pacific, Equity and Diversity and Sustainability strategic frameworks.
